The bee begins her ceaseless hum, And doth with sweet exertions rise; And with delight she stores her comb, And well her rising stock supplies.


Let sportive children well beware, While sprightly frisking o'er the green;

George Moses Horton

George Moses Horton is believed to have been born around 1797 or 1798 in Northampton County, NC. In 1800, George, his mother, and his siblings—all enslaved—were moved to Chatham County, NC to a tobacco plantation.

At an early age, Horton taught himself to read using religious hymnals and other reading material he was able to acquire from white children. Though he was unable to write until later in his adult years, he would compose poems in his head and later recite them.

As a teen, Sundays for Horton consisted of taking fruits to Chapel Hill to sell to students at the University of North Volume III, Issue 2 April 1, 2015

Carolina and others. In the biography George Moses Horton:

American Poet, William Carrroll notes salesmen had to entertain their potential buyers prior to purchase. This practice led to Horton reciting his poems and eventually being paid to compose love poems for students on campus. His talents were in great demand.

Though still enslaved in 1829, Horton became the first published black in the South with his first printed poem, "Liberty and Slavery" as well as his first book, The Hope of Liberty.

Horton Middle School in Pittsboro, NC is named for him in addition to George Moses Horton Residence Hall located on the campus of UNC-CH.
