Thomas Day

Revered North Carolina Furniture Maker

Thomas Day was born a free black in 1801 in Dinwiddie, Virginia to a white mother and black father. His family moved to Warren County, North Carolina in 1817 "because of increasing restrictions against free African Americans in the early nineteenth century in Virginia".

Day's father, John Day, Sr., was a successful cabinetmaker. Thomas worked under the apprenticeship of his father and also studied woodcarving in Boston and Washington, DC.

In 1825, Day moved to Milton, North Carolina where he established his own cabinetmaking business. His work—"characterized by tightly curlicued scrollwork; bulbous, carvedwooden 'thumb' ornaments; flowing, symmetrical S-curves; and a careful balance between positive and negative space"—was purchased by wealthy planters and other prominent people and politicians in Caswell County. Day apprenticed whites as well as enslaved persons of color.

Remarkably, Day's craftsmanship allowed him to cross racial barriers. For example, in exchange for crafting the pews for the Milton Presbyterian Church, he and his family were allowed to sit amongst the white congregation. Other free and enslaved blacks had to sit upstairs. Years earlier when a North Carolina law prohibited him from moving his free African American wife from Virginia to Milton, the North Carolina attorney general and more than 60 whites submitted a petition to the General Assembly. As a result, Day was granted an exemption which allowed his wife to migrate to the state.

By 1850, Day's furniture company was the largest in North Carolina.
